

of flowing water — such earthly pleasures are hard to come by among the concrete canyons of a major city. Yet the terrace garden of Heather Munoz and Mark LaPedes includes these natural delights and more—all framed by spectacular views of the Chicago skyline. Hard to believe the comfortable outdoor living space was once an empty, 1,400-square-foot concrete slab.

The couple bought their condo for its grand gardening possibilities, but the large size of the outdoor space, the condo association's restrictions, and the logistics of




ANTIQUE IRON THE EASY WAY

Give a new iron pergola or other outdoor structure a rustic patina in just a few hours. Landscaping contractor Christy Webber explains her technique: "Spray the fresh iron with a bleach solution—this will immediately create rust. Next, go over the entire piece with steel wool to soften and blend the color of the finish. Hose off the structure with water, then spray polyurethane to seal."

Stylish and durable, solution-dyed acrylic **CUSHION FABRIC** is designed to withstand extreme sunlight, temperatures, and moisture without fading or mildewing.

Besides beautifying the outdoor living room, an **OUTDOOR RUG helps** define the space.

transporting materials and plants skyward without a freight elevator proved daunting. "We had plenty of ideas for what we wanted in the garden, but weren't quite sure how to put it all together," Mark says. "We wanted it to be a natural extension of the house — a place that would give us privacy from the units above us, yet would still allow us to enjoy the city views below."

Blending Styles

Aesthetically, the couple envisioned a natural look. But Mark had contemporary leanings, while Heather's tastes were more traditional. "Mark wanted stone, gravel, and wood, as well as a fire pit, like those used in Arizona, where he grew up. I've always loved that look ... but I also wanted a soft-looking English-style border of perennials," Heather says.

Working with landscape architect Stephen Prassas and landscape contractor Christy Webber, the couple created four garden rooms. The home's living room extends naturally to a terrace living room; the indoor dining room flows into an outdoor eating area edged by a water garden. A planter wall filled with tall perennials encloses a private sitting area outside the bedroom. Near the railing, a rec room of sorts yields a sunny space for a fire pit and 37-foot bed of colorful prairie flowers and airy grasses.

A FLAGSTONE FIREPLACE provides pleasant warmth on cool nights. The stash of hickory wood is for grilling dinners under the stars.



Soft gravel underfoot gives the FLOOR in the fire pit area an informal feel, unlike the other outdoor rooms.





Designed to blend in with an existing fence, a WOODEN SHED provides valuable storage space.

Even a small area can yield usable space. Tucked between the shed and a planter, an intimate SITTING AREA invites conversation.

An iron pergola over three of the outdoor rooms creates privacy from the units above, without blocking views below. Vine-covered lattice shields the living and sitting rooms; solid canvas covers the dining area. The pergola's weathered, antique patina reflects the style of the interior furnishings and the aged metal of the surrounding cityscape.

For the hardscape, brick and stone in shades of warm red and brown provide the contemporary Southwestern look Mark wanted. "The precast concrete pavers have been ground down to a terrazzolike finish - just as Mark did inside the home," Prassas says. "This gives the terrace rich color and texture."

For Heather's garden, Prassas designed a lush border with a Midwestern feel. Native coneflowers, phlox, black-eyed Susans, and ornamental grasses give the bed an informal, prairie look and are easy to maintain. "We selected plants that are hardy - ones that did not require lots of water and that could tolerate the site's high winds," he says.





Throughout the garden rooms, containers are filled with flowers, vines, and herbs. Some of the pots are the same antiqued iron as the pergola; others are zinc or terra-cotta. Comfortable furnishings with bright red fabric tie together the rooms, complementing the easy, natural look of plants, pots, and structures.

Designing a beautiful, functional garden space within the condo's parameters was a challenge. Getting the plants and materials up to the couple's sixth-floor site proved to be an even bigger hurdle. Not only did the team need to figure out how to lift tons of materials over a busy city street, but it also had to be sure to distribute

the weight evenly once it arrived at the site.

Webber and her crew proved up to the task. "We practiced for weeks before the actual move," she says. "With a one-day permit to use the crane, and cameras filming our every move [for a TV program], we couldn't afford to make any mistakes."

The move went off without a hitch; all of the materials were hoisted into place in just seven hours. Ten days later, all four garden rooms - including stone and flagstone pavers, walls, planters, pergola, water garden, and fire pit—were complete.

A BUBBLER drowns out street noise and supplies the soothing sound of water throughout all of the rooms.


Purple coneflowers and other hardy perennials add a soft, casual look to the SUNNY BORDER. Their easygoing nature makes them ideal for pots, too.

WATER PLANTS such as lotus, water hyacinths, and giant reeds infuse container water gardens with attractive color and texture.
